### Course Description

The goal of this course is to introduce you to the field of psychology by briefly covering a sample of the topics studied by psychologists. Upon completing this course, including the readings, lectures and tutorials, you should have a solid understanding of the way psychologists approach many everyday problems and some knowledge of the difference between psychology the science and the common understanding of psychology as found in the popular media. Throughout the lectures, I will try to bring in examples from a variety of sources to help make it clear that psychological approaches can make more clear issues we all face in the course of our lives.

#### *Quizzes*

Quizzes will include information from both the lectures and the reading. They will be weighted equally and will comprise 40 multiple choice questions and 2 short answer questions.

If for some (good!) reason, you must miss a quiz, you must inform Grace Poon or Joanna Lee at least 48 hours before the quiz. You must then make an appointment with one of them to retake the quiz on or near the day you return to the University. If you do not inform either of them in the given time period, you will receive a zero for that quiz.

Should you become sick on the day of the quiz and miss it for that reason, bring a signed letter from your doctor stating the reason for your illness on the day you return to classes at the University. The missed quiz must be taken on that same day. No other exceptions will be allowed.
